<u>Earth Week at Retzer</u> – Join us for our Friends of Retzer annual meeting and chili dinner on Monday, April 22nd. Dinner begins at 5:30pm, followed by the annual business meeting at 6:15pm and featured speaker at 7:00pm. This year's guest speaker is Waukesha County Conservation Biologist, Julia Robson, who will provide an overview of her exciting county-wide citizen science initiative, launched last fall in a series of "Wild in Waukesha" training sessions. Supplies and equipment for this program were funded by the Friends.

Later that week, on Saturday, April 27th (10am - 2pm), join us again at Retzer for their annual Earth Week celebration, which will include interactive activities for kids, an outdoor service project, and guided hikes. You'll also have a chance to view our newly-renovated animal enclosure exhibit in the nature center lobby.

<u>Coming attractions</u> – As final touches are being made on the new animal enclosures and wall monitor displays in the nature center lobby, the Friends wish to thank MK Kelly for her tireless oversight of this funded initiative. Also, thanks to financial support from the Friends and from the Waukesha Rotary Club, a major renovation of Retzer's *Adventure Trail* is underway. Among other improvements, the three-year project will include upgrade and expansion of the boardwalk and construction of a creative children's play and learning area. A summary of preliminary project plans will be presented at our annual meeting.

Maintaining Central America Connections

<u>Cuba Natural History Tour</u> – Costa Rican naturalist and guide, Carlos Chavarria, is teaming up next month with the Friends of Retzer on a first-time natural history tour of Cuba. The trip will include tours of the rugged cave region of Vinales, the vast wetlands of Cienaga de Zapata, the montane forests of Topes de Collantes, and the coastal shores of Cayo Santa Maria. Historic sites in Trinidad and Havana will also be visited. Pending evaluation of this initial trip experience, a second trip to Cuba in 2020 is possible.

<u>Programme for Belize update</u> – Each year, the Friends donate \$1000 from our educational outreach fund to the Programme for Belize in Central America, for the purpose of supporting an overnight tropical ecology workshop for youth in their vast Rio Bravo tropical forest reserve. (Of note, the PfBelize co-organized and hosted a Friends of Retzer natural history tour five years ago.) This past February, a group of 24 students and teachers from Trinidad Government School were treated to a weekend of birdwatching, trail hiking, animal tracking, and archaeological site investigation, with themes of tropical ecology environmental stewardship underscoring each activity. La Milpa eco-lodge naturalists Vladimir, Melvis and Marcos organized the workshop.
