- WAUKESHA COUNTY PARKS SUMMER BEER GARDEN: Retzer Nature Center will be hosting the popular event on the consecutive evenings of Friday, August 23 and Saturday, August 24. Once again, *Raised Grain Brewery* will offer up an assortment of brews, food truck vendors will provide additional munchies, and *JRyanTrio* will be providing a free jazz performance from 5:30pm-8:30pm. A buffet chili dinner was served at 5:30pm, followed by our annual business meeting and featured presentation by Wisconsin Master Naturalist Program Director, Becky Sapper. Member attendees heard an update from Parks and Land Use Senior Landscape Architect Nicki Jensen on the proposed *Outdoor Classroom and Shelter* project, and 50th Anniversary Committee shared plans for the upcoming "Cheers for 50 Years" event on June 22. Nature Center Supervisor Janet Barthel provided a statistical summary of Retzer's busy year of programming, and President Larry Kascht offered a recap of the organization's activities and achievements over the past months. He also extended well wishes to Steve Martin and Elaine Haberichter, who were stepping off the Board after years of dedicated service to the Friends. In turn, newly-elected Board members Meg Shad, Helen Holtz and Jenny Carter were welcomed into the fold.

<u>"FOOD TRUCK FRIDAY" FEATURES FRIENDS OF RETZER:</u> Waukesha County Airport hosted its first Food Truck Friday gathering of the season on May 31, and a percentage of the proceeds from the food truck sales were donated to a worthy non-profit organization – us! President Andi Kornowski and other Board members were on hand to share plans for the proposed outdoor shelter and promote the many nature center projects and programs supported by our membership. Some Waukesha residents commented that they'd never been to Retzer, so it was a great opportunity to meet local folks and make new contacts.

<u>PRAIRIE SPRINGS ENVIRONMENTAL CENTER FIELD TRIP</u>: Fifteen Friends members gathered in Genesee Depot on June 5 for a presentation by Carroll University Professor of Biology Todd Levine on the history of the university's 75-acre Genesee Creek field station and the various wetland and prairie restoration research and monitoring initiatives currently underway there. Dr. Levine shared that the goals of the facility are threefold: 1) to educate students in wetland ecology; 2) to protect, manage and serve as stewards of the natural setting; and 3) to create new knowledge about the site via ongoing field research. He added that practical training in natural site management included such skills as chainsaw safety, controlled burn ecology, and wildlife handling. Drones are being used to monitor experimental burns on the site's prairie plots as well as buckthorn eradication activity in the Genesee Creek riparian zone. We look to schedule another Friends visit to the field station next spring.



<u>WISCONSIN MASTER NATURALIST TRAINING WEEK</u> was hosted by Retzer July 15-20 and attended by 19 participants from around the state. The week-long workshop included visits to the City of Waukesha Clean Water Plant, UWM-Waukesha Field Station, Carroll University's Prairie Springs Environmental Education Center, Fox River Park, Lapham Peak and Retzer's own Horwitz-DeRemer Planetarium. Featured speakers addressed numerous topics of relevance, including Kelly La Blanc on glacial geology, Abbie Liedtke on recycling, Marlin Johnson on prairie and oak plant communities, Julia Robson and Samantha Schwartz on mesic forest and wetland plant communities, Jayne Jenks on aquatic life, and Lindsey Slater on weather and climate.



Milwaukee's WISN-12 forecast meteorologist Lindsey Slater discussed topics of contemporary concern ranging from climate change history to recent atmospheric trends and extremes, and underscored our role as informed citizens in responding to the compelling climate research evidence.
